



BRITISH KNIAPSACK CA. 1779




This canvas knapsack apparently came into use by Butler's Rangers around the end of 1778. Canvas for this purpose: "10 Pieces Russia Drilling for Knapsacks" was requested by Butler at this time. An existing knapsack of the period, just post-dating the War, bears the designation "TENTH/REGIMENT. N.B. MILITIA.", and a crown flanked by G^{III}/R surmounting a sprig of thistle, in a cartouch on a red ochre ground.² The watercolours by Dages of 1792, show knapsacks similarly embellished.

However, it is not thought proper at this time to put forward such a scheme for the Corps.

ALL STRAPS OF 6-8 OC. BUFF.

TOGGLE ATTACHMENTS, THONGS KNOTTED INSIDE PASSED THROUGH LEATHER "WASHERS"

- TIE STRAPS: 8, @ 20" x 3/5" (A)
- BUCKLE " : 3, @ 3" x 7/8" (B)
- " " : 3, @ 5" x 7/8" (C)
